

SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

Jennifer Hughes, PhD, MPH. Jennifer L. Hughes, Ph.D., M.P.H., is an Assistant Professor and Licensed Psychologist at the UT Southwestern Center for Depression Research and Clinical Care (CDRC). She is the head of the CDRC Risk and Resilience Network, which aims to build partnerships with local schools and youth community organizations to implement mental health promotion and suicide prevention programs, as well as to work together to better understand resilience and risk in youth. Dr. Hughes is currently on the Executive Board of the American Psychological Association Division 53 Society of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology (SCCAP) and serves as the Past-Chair of the Association for Behavioral and Cognitive Therapies (ABCT) Child and Adolescent Depression Special Interest Group (SIG). Broadly, Dr. Hughes' research explores the efficacy and effectiveness of psychosocial treatments for building resilience, the prevention and treatment of youth depression, and addressing suicide in youth.


Robert Kinney, PhD. Robert Kinney, Ph.D. works in the UT Southwestern Center for Depression Research and Clinical Care (CDRC), and teaches in the division of psychology. Dr. Kinney leads the CDRC Mood Disorders Network. This Network aims to create and maintain partnerships with primary care and specialty clinics with the goals of identifying and treating mental health concerns, as well as garnering understanding of mood disorders. Dr. Kinney holds a doctorate in counseling psychology from Seton Hall University as well as an MA in Mental Health and Wellness from New York University. His experience includes the APA accredited Student Counselling Center at UT Dallas, community mental health, university health centers, hospitals, and outpatient practice. His areas of expertise include depression, mood disorders, risk assessment, psychodynamics, and lifespan development.

Jessica Moore, MD. Jessica Moore, MD is a second year child and adolescent psychiatry fellow at UT Southwestern (UTSW) Medical Center in Dallas, Texas. Dr. Moore served as one the psychiatry chief residents during both residency and fellowship. She is the co-founder of the UTSW Psychiatry Race, Diversity and Inclusion task force. During residency, Dr. Moore helped develop an initiative at Paul Quinn College to provide and engage students in mental health and wellness services. She also serves on the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry's (AACAP) College Mental Health and Transitional Age Youth Committee. Dr. Moore has presented at several national meetings on topics of diversity in college mental health and wrote on book chapter on helping first-generation college students with mental health disorders succeed.

Preston Wiles, MD. Dr. Wiles is the Drs. Anne and George Race Professor of Student Psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center and Director of Student Wellness and Counseling program there. He completed his residency in Psychiatry at Harvard and Yale Medical Schools. Dr. Wiles served on the clinical faculty at Yale Medical School since 1992, teaching medical students, residents, and fellows in the areas of child development, psychopharmacology, and children and the law. He was a guest lecturer at Yale Law School and was elected Fellow at Branford College at Yale, where he served as a freshman advisor at Yale College. Dr. Wiles is a recognized expert in the treatment of young people with neuropsychiatric disorders including autism spectrum disorders, ADHD, and learning disability.

Timothy Wolff, MD. Dr. Timothy Wolff is a professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern. He is the Medical Director of the Paul Quinn College Student Wellness and Counseling Service, Assistant Medical Director of the Parkland Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic, and Associate Residency Training Director for the general adult psychiatry residency program at U.T. Southwestern. He has been a staff psychiatrist for the UT Southwestern Student Wellness and Counseling Service for over 30 years. His undergraduate degree was from Brown University and medical degree from U.T Southwestern. He did his residency at Baylor College of Medicine where he also work at Rice University Student Mental Health for 6 months.
